The Home Safety Council® wants you to be ready in case a disaster happens where you live.

In a fire, flood, tornado, hurricane, or power outage, you may have to find a safe place away from home. In some emergencies you may have to stay at home for many days. Either way, you and your family should be prepared.

A 2007 survey of mothers and their children ages 6 to 11 reports that 6 out of 10 families believe they are prepared for an emergency. But only 3 of these families have a plan for how they would find each other in an emergency. Most families have not packed the things they would need if they have to leave their home fast. Many do not have the supplies they would need to stay at home for a few days.

Four Steps You Can Take to Be Safe

There are four simple things you can to do to help keep you,
your family, and the people in your home safe in an emergency.



Step 1:

Talk about what can happen in an emergency and what people should do.



Step 2:

Make a Ready-to-Stay Kit in case you cannot leave your home.



Step 3:

Make a Ready-to-Go Kit in case you have to leave your home.



Step 4:

Write down contact information you will need in an emergency.

Let's learn more about each of these steps.

Step 1: Talk About Emergencies

- Talk about the different kinds of weather that can happen where you live. For example, do you have floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, or ice storms?
- Help children feel safe. Tell them that someone will be there to help in an emergency. Talk about people you can count on in an emergency such as firefighters, police, teachers, neighbors and disaster workers.
- Put a list of emergency numbers by each telephone in your home. Tell your children what each number is for. You should also list the work and cell phone number for each person in your family or in your home.



Step 2: Make a Ready-to-Stay Kit

Your Ready-to-Stay Kit should include the items you will need to stay safe at home for a few days. You can keep these things at home in a plastic tub or a special cabinet.



• Three gallons of water for each family member



• Canned food and snacks for at least three days



Toilet paperPet food and supplies for three days



Non-scented bleach to treat unsafe water



Blankets



• Books and games to keep you busy



Paper and pencils



First aid kit



Step 3: Make a Ready-to-Go Kit

Keep Ready-to-Go Kit items in a backpack or duffle bag. Take

these with you if you have to leave your home so you can be safe.



- One gallon of water for each person
- Food that you don't have to keep cold and a manual can opener

Flashlight and extra batteries

Plastic or paper plates, cups, and utensils



- Radio with batteries
- A change of clothes
- A card with emergency contact information and the number of someone to call who lives out of town



- Pet food and supplies for at least three days
- Small first aid kit
- Personal identification card
- Personal hygiene items, soap, and hand sanitizer
- Store medicine you usually take near your Ready-to-Go Kit



Step 4: Write Down the Information You Will Need

- Each family member needs a contact card.
- Each card should have contact numbers for family members, child care, doctors and fire or police.
- Have the card with you all the time.
- Update the card if someone moves or changes jobs.
